All year, we have seen striking examples of care and belonging, within a peer group, a Tutor Group, a Year Group, RWBA, Ascend Learning Trust and beyond to the wider community. Once again, we have also seen incredible numbers of Parents and Guardians support us with recognising achievements. Our Sports Awards Evening was a celebration of participation in Sport from over 1400 students with over 330 students awarded honours.

Our Year 13 Celebrations Evening and our invites to Year 11s to celebrate their academic success last year were both a reminder of the strong bonds maintained between school and home. The Duke of Edinburgh Awards Evening saw the largest numbers of students recognised and awarded, ever. We were also reminded that RWBA has one of the largest cohorts in the whole of the South West. Every night for Bugsy Malone was sold out and it was a great example of students from all ages working together. The audiences left impressed at the talent we have on show. We have County Champions in Years 9 &10 Girls Rounders. Rhiannon Bullock from Year 10 was awarded Student of the Year by Wiltshire College, quite the accolade from a College that takes its roll from 15 - 18 year olds across and beyond Wiltshire.

More external recognition of what we do and have achieved this year came through gaining the Silver Healthy Schools Award, 2 of our students won a County wide

competition, as voted for by all Wiltshire schools where they created a Podcast on Healthy Relationships. Jack Shaw and Ryan Woods from Year 10 were the recipients and demonstrated such confidence in their oracy. We gained a Bronze Award from the National Citizens Service and were second only to a Grammar School for participation. There are more awards coming Bassett's way, but they are under embargo whilst we await confirmation and verification. We will communicate this to you when we can but to say that celebrations of the calibre and quality of our students and staff both internally and externally have been varied and many, would be an understatement.

STEM SUCCESS

STEM Success trip to We The Curious in Bristol In early July a group of Year 7, 8 and 9 students travelled to the newly re-opened We the Curious science museum in Bristol. It was a day to embrace their inner science geek and to explore many different types of activities in the exhibits. Students explored the mass of brains as we age, pendulums, how sand is made and how it is used, the length of DNA genomes of certain organisms and air using air canons.

Students were also treated to the "Phantoms of the Universe" show in the museum's planetarium allowing the students to experience the search for elusive dark matter – from protons racing through the world's largest particle collider to up-close views of the Big Bang and the descent to an experiment a mile underground. Students learned where dark matter can be found, the research involved in finding dark matter and what scientists are doing to research dark matter in space.

All students also participated in a workshop where they were introduced to the myth of Bigfoot and given different pieces of evidence to examine to consider the validity of claims of Bigfoot's existence. Students looked at footprint casts, hair samples using microscopes and were able to use gel electrophoresis equipment. This equipment allowed students to visually see DNA and observe how DNA separates throughout the gel.

This year has seen record numbers take part in the Duke of Edinburgh's Award at RWBA, with 94 taking part in Bronze award, 62 in the Silver award and 30 at Gold level.

Reflecting on the previous year, I am immensely proud of the students at RWBA that continue to put themselves forward as upstanders and role models for the school community and beyond.

RWBA is a school that puts the student at the core of all it does. As student parliament is pupil led, I would like to begin with quotes from students explaining what being part of RWBA SP means for them:

"It personally means a lot for me to be in student parliament, I have always wanted to make a change to how people like me are treated and I feel like student parliament is one of the best ways for me to go about it. Everything I have done before, during and will do after student parliament will be always to make another person feel like they belong."

"As an Asian female student that largely surrounds herself with people from minority groups I have been through and heard of experiences that are unique to the experience of being a minority student at RWBA. Due to this I will bring a certain sensitivity to these issues that is required and maybe a better understanding so these issues can be better dealt with and students from these groups can feel like they matter."

"Personally, being a member of Student Parliament has been extremely meaningful as it allowed me to see change within RWBA, and to see the confidence of the members of the Well Being cabinet grow. For example, when the Well Being cabinet did projects for Children's Mental Health Week, and Eating Disorder Awareness week, students began to have conversations, and start to open up about these topics, that many students usually do not feel as comfortable speaking about. This openness and willingness to learn shown by the students was amazing to witness, and I want this kind of change and these kinds of conversations to continue within RWBA, as a result of Student Parliament."

What has Student Parliament been up to this year?

The Environment Cabinet has worked hard to push for greater diversity within the food at school, and Terry's has created some themed days from this. Throughout the school year they have been out in all weathers litter picking to ensure that they are clear role models for the wider school and to protect the environment and small animals that may be around the school grounds. They helped with recycling of unused school uniform to new or current parents helping them find the sizes they need. Any re-used uniform from ex pupils is a fantastic way of helping the environment but also helping reduce the costs of school uniform.

They also promoted Earth Day and created resources for this as well as raising money for WWF through a non-school uniform day and bakes sales. Well done Environment Cabinet! The Teaching and Learning Cabinet helped with world book day and advertised and judged the most incredible bake-off house competition where students baked and decorated cake(s) that were based on a book! It was incredible to see the results. They also were looking at what the RWBA values mean to them, along with the new Ascend Learner Trust values. Following the change in phone rules, they put forward to the staff leadership team that the school needed some more clocks so students could check the time. Fabulous job!







The Wellbeing Cabinet worked incredibly hard this academic year, and created incredible student led resources for children's mental health week. These resources were impactful, and it was wonderful to see 6th form ministers of the cabinet take such a strong leadership role in helping younger students with their mental health and wellbeing.

They also created resources around Eating Awareness Disorder week that were delivered to the older KS3 and 4 students. The cabinet also asked students what their key worries were and placed both these worries and advice around the boards on Centrepoint, so students could feel less alone in things they may be going through.






The Antibullying cabinet explored the differences between 'banter' and 'bullying behaviours' and place key posters with the definitions on around social areas and the toilets, so perhaps at times students could check in with their own behaviours or the behaviours of others. They also created a drop-in centre for break times once a week in case anyone wanted to come and talk about things they had seen or had been experiencing.

The identity Cabinet have been extremely pro-active in helping to fundraise and design a space for neurodiverse students to go to at break times or lunch times if they would like to. This new space has been proposed by student parliament to be called 'The Haven' and will include soft furnishing and a calm, safe zone when required.

The cabinet will continue to hopefully see this come to fruition in the new academic year. They have raised money to help with this through many bake sales and also helped to raise funds for RWBA Culture day through an innovative ice cream sale. The cabinet continues to raise profile for minority groups within school and ensure all voices are heard.

Student Parliament is such an incredible part of school life at RWBA. It is such a positive thing to witness students feeling empowered to make changes, and to make the world a better place. There are going to be some key changes next year to enable student parliament to grow and reflect the changing climate within school. Antibullying cabinet will become the



'Antibullying and welcome ambassadors' and these will be selected by Heads of Year and Student Support Managers to ensure the students are really impactful role models for the school and will be strong upstanders to help us with the antibullying campaign.

Y9 HOLOCAUST EDUCATION DAY

On Tuesday 9th July we were privileged to welcome Bernie Graham, Louisa Clein, Charlotte Lane, and Professor Stuart Foster into Royal Wootton Bassett Academy to take part in our Year 9 Holocaust Education Day.

Our Year 9 cohort was split into three sections, each of whom followed the family story of either Bernie, Louisa and her sister Natalie, or Noemie Lopian. They were able to meet with Bernie and Louisa and discuss their families' stories and how they had impacted them.

This was a particular powerful experience for our pupils as they were able to associate the horrors of the Holocaust with real people and real families, while being left with a message of hope. We would like to thank Bernie, Louisa, and Stuart, as well as all the teachers who helped to make the day a reality, and of course Charlotte and Nic Wetherall, who spent so much of their time creating and developing the resources for the day.

This project will have a lasting impact on our school community and will continue to inspire our young people for many years to come.

SPORTING SUCCESS

Toby has been wheelchair racing for a year and a half now. He secured sponsorship at the end of last year and they funded a brand-new race chair for Toby. This is his first season in his new race

chair and is already seeing amazing results. Toby competed in the Wiltshire Athletics Championships on 12th May where he became 3 times gold medallist in 100m sprint, 200m sprint and Javelin.

Toby also completed in the Welsh Championships on 22nd June where he became two times gold medallist in 100m and 400m sprints. Toby now currently holds Wiltshire Champion and Welsh Champion titles. Toby is competing at the end of July in the Alexander Stadium in Birmingham where he is hoping to medal and get English champion title.

Toby has also competed against able bodied athletes at an event in Bristol in the 1500m race. Toby placed 2nd out of 14 athletes!. He was the only wheelchair racer in that event so did fantastic. It was also the first time Toby had raced that distance. Toby has been breaking all records so far this season with new person bests in all categories. He is currently 1st in his age category and 8th in the country on power of 10.

His current PBs are: 100m17.35 seconds new PB 400m 60.01 seconds new PB and a massive 5 seconds off his previous PB 800m 2 minutes 8 seconds, new PB and a massive 20 seconds off his previous PB

It has been an amazing season so far and it's not over yet!



TERM 5 & 6 PE AND SPORT HIGHLIGHTS

- Early in term 5 our U16 boys football team lost a very tight Swindon Schools Football final. We were very proud to come a close second.
- Year 7 and 8 were crowned County Swimming Champions. Since 2017 only one other school appears on this trophy.
- In North Wiltshire Athletics Trials we had 13 pupils qualify for the North Wiltshire team. With 4 achieving a podium finish at the County Finals and all others placing 4th!!
- Year 7 Super 8 Athletics in Swindon. Our girls took bronze medal and Sienna was the highest points scorer across all girls in Swindon.
- Year 7 & 8 girls touch rugby team won the Swindon district event and went on to claim the bronze medal at the Wiltshire County Event.
- Our year 7, 8, 9 & 10 District Athletics team had 100 plus pupils claim 2nd place at the largest athletics event of the season. This is our highest placement ever!! Our girls' teams placed 1st overall and our boy's placed 3rd.
- Year 9 mixed touch rugby team competed in a regional qualifier and won the whole event! This meant they earned a trip to Worcester Warriors to

- play in the National Finals. Although they didn't place at this event, their demonstration of values and fair play has earned them the opportunity to play at Twickenham next year!!
- We had more girls playing cricket than ever before.
 Our yr7 & 8 team placed 3rd from 10 schools in a county softball event.
- Year 9 and 10 girls rounders won the Swindon tournament and for the first time ever went on to win the County Finals!! We are county champions!!!

CAR PARK RULES

Parking at Royal Wootton Bassett Academy

The speed limit on site a is 5 mph.

Car parks are designated as follows:-

- · Parking spaces inside entrance is for staff only
- · Main Car Park is for staff and visitors who have an appointment in school

Do not drop off or park in this area at any time.

When you enter site there is a road to the left which is for commercial deliveries only and should not be obstructed by parked vehicles. Do not park or use this area as a turning point.

The site has two disabled bays, these are for disabled badge holders only. These rules are in place to ensure the safety of all persons on the site specifically your child or children.

IMMUNISATIONS

While your child is in secondary school, they will be eligible to receive routine vaccinations in Year 8 and Year 9. The immunisation team is comprised of experienced nurses and support workers and will visit the school several times throughout the school year.

All year 8 students are eligible to receive the HPV vaccine. HPV is linked to several different cancers such as cervical cancer, some head, neck and throat cancers, genital cancer and anal cancers and is also responsible for genital warts.

All year 9 students are eligible for their Diptheria, Tetanus and Polio booster (Td/IPV) and at the same time, the Meningitis ACWY vaccinations (MenACWY)
